Challenge coins have a long history within the militaries of the United States and, indeed, around the world. Starting out as a form of identification, there is a tale of a downed World War I American pilot making his way friendly lines showing back and to coin as his only form challenge identification to the French soldiers. French recognized the unit crest and rather than executing the would-be prisoner, gave him a bottle of wine and escorted him back to American positions. Today, challenge coins have been widely adopted not only throughout the military, but often by first responders police and fire units. Those such a s possession of a challenge coin are supposed to carry one on them at all times. If someone shows their coin in challenge to another, and the other person cannot produce their coin, they owe the challenger a drink. If they do have their coin, the challenger must buy.

Coins have also evolved to serve purposes of unit spirit and morale, and as an on-the-spot award or recognition. We are pleased this year to be recognizing the contribution of our sponsors through the presentation of challenge coins commemorating the 247th USMC Birthday.

GUEST OF HONOR COLONEL KEITH B. BURKEPILE







Colonel Keith E. Burkepile

Colonel Burkepile is originally from Carlisle, Pennsylvania and is a 1992 graduate of West Virginia University where he earned a Bachelors of Science Degree in Civil Engineering. He enlisted in the Marine Corps in 1985 and attained the rank of Sergeant in the Marine Corp Reserve prior to attending Officer Candidates Course in January of 1994. He immediately attended The Basic School and Officer Basic Course at Ft Sill which upon graduating he was given the designation of field artillery officer.

His initial assignment was to Battery "I", Third Battalion, Eleventh Marine Regiment where he served as a Forward Observer, Fire Direction Officer, and Executive Officer. After two and a

half years in Battery "I", he was assigned as the battalion maintenance management officer/embarkation officer/S-4A.

In January of 1998, First Lieutenant Burkepile was transferred to Expeditionary Warfare Training Group, Atlantic at Little Creek Naval Amphibious Base, Norfolk, Virginia and subsequently promoted to Captain. He was assigned as a fire support instructor and course manager for the fire support coordination course. He also instructed in the Tactical Air Control Party course that certified forward air controllers, Special Operations Spotters Course, and Supporting Arms Coordination Center Course. In March of 2000, Captain Burkepile attended the Field Artillery Captains Career Course at Ft Sill Oklahoma and graduated as the Distinguished Honor Graduate.

In August of 2000, Captain Burkepile was assigned to First Battalion, Twelfth Marine Regiment in Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii. He initially served as Assistant Liaison Officer to Third Marine Regiment and then was assigned as the Assistant Operations Officer. Captain Burkepile assumed command of Battery "C" in November of 2001 and executed a unit deployment to Okinawa. He relinquished command of Battery "C" in May of 2003.

In June of 2003, Captain Burkepile was transferred to Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Parris Island, South Carolina. He was assigned as Battalion Executive of Support Battalion, Recruit Training Regiment and subsequently promoted to Major in September 2003. In March 2004, he was assigned as Director of Drill Instructor School and held that position until May of 2006.

In May of 2006, Major Burkepile was transferred to Officer Candidates School, Quantico Virginia. He was assigned as Commander of Company "K". In July of 2006, Major Burkepile was assigned as a student to the School of Advanced Warfighting and graduated in June of 2007 with a Master's Degree in Operational Studies.


In June of 2007, Major Burkepile was assigned as a planner in II Marine Expeditionary Force and immediately deployed in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom 06-08. He was assigned as a Ground Combat Element planner, II Marine Expeditionary Force (Forward). He redeployed in February of 2008. He again assumed duties as a planner in II Marine Expeditionary Force and was reassigned to II Marine Expeditionary Force (Forward) in June of 2008. Major Burkepile deployed in support of OIF 09 as the Deputy Team Chief/ Operations and Plans Officer for the Anbar Operations Command Advisor Team. He redeployed in September 2009.

Lieutenant Colonel Burkepile was assigned as Commanding Officer, 2nd Battalion 10th Marines from 4 December 2009 to 22 November 2011. He assumed duties as the 10th Marine Regiment Executive Officer on 5 December 2011. In July 2012 he was assigned as a student to the Eisenhower School for National Security and Resource Strategy and graduated in June 2013 as a Distinguished Graduate with a Master of Science degree. He assumed duties at USAFRICOM, J5 in July 2013 serving as Branch Chief of Future Plans and Campaign Plans. He assumed duties as II MEF Future Operations and Plans Officer in July 2016 and was promoted to his present rank on 1 October 2016. Colonel Burkepile was assigned as Commanding Officer, Headquarters and Service Battalion, Marine Forces Pacific from 7 July 2017 – 3 July 2019.

Colonel Burkepile reported to the U.S. Army War College in July of 2019.

His personal decorations include the Legion of Merit, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal with two gold stars, the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal with three gold stars, the Joint Service Achievement Medal, the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal with gold star, and the Selective Marine Corps Reserve Medal. He is married to the former Kimberly Harms of Oak Park, Illinois; they have three sons, Marcus (25), Wyatt (17), and Benjamin (13).

Appointed by Commandant Richard Gore as the Department of Massachusetts Legislative Officer for the Marine Corps League in 2007. Served in all elected positions for the Dept of Mass culminating with Dept Commandant 2012 - 14. Served as National Assistant Vice Commandant 2015, National Division Vice Commandant 2016 -17, National Judge Advocate 2017 -19, National Junior Vice Commandant 2019 - 21, National Senior Vice presently. Paul Hastings Major USMC (Ret)

On March 1, 1950, Paul Hastings a 17 year old high school senior enlisted in the U. S. Marine Corps Reserve unit in Harrisburg Pennsylvania. After graduation in June 1950, he attended Amphibious training at Little Creek, Virginia. At the outbreak of the Korean War the Reserve Unit was ordered to active duty in August 1950. Paul transferred to the 22nd Marines in Quantico then reassigned to the Schools Demonstration unit at Quantico where he served the remainder of his 18 months of active duty. He returned home and was immediately accepted for return to active duty with the Inspector-Instructor staff of the newly reformed Reserve Unit in Harrisburg.



While serving with the I-I staff Paul was selected for commissioning under the Meritorious NCO Program. Following his officer training, Paul was assigned to the 3rd Marine Division where he served as the Executive Officer and then Commanding Officer of E-2-3. Following his overseas assignment he served in several units throughout the Corps including Marine Corps Base, Camp LeJeune, the 1st Marine Division, then again with the 3rd Marine Division on Okinawa, the Marine Corps Supply Activity in Philadelphia, the Marine Corps Air Station, Beaufort, South Carolina, the Republic of Vietnam and lastly at the Headquarters, Fleet Marine Forces in Hawaii where he served until being ordered to the Philadelphia Naval Hospital for processing in connection with a medical disability. He subsequently was placed on the disability retired list of Marines on April 1, 1972.

Hastings served in the enlisted grades Private through Technical Sergeant and as an officer of Marines, Second Lieutenant through Major. He is authorized to wear the Korean Serve Medal, United Nations Medal, the Vietnam Service Medal, the Meritorious Service Medal and the Navy/Marine Corps Commendation Medal with "V", and the Marine Corps Good Conduct Medal. In addition, he earned the Marine Corps' Silver Distinguished Marksmanship Badge.

Hastings is a life member of several Veteran organizations, including the Marine Corps League; The Veterans of Foreign Wars; the American Legion; the Disabled American Veterans; the AMVETS; the Retired Officers Association; the Marine Corps Reserve Officers Association and the Navy League.

Hastings became very active in the Marine Corps League and he was elected to the office of National Commandant of the Marine Corps League after serving at the Detachment and Department levels. In 1984, Governor Dick Thornburgh appointed Paul to serve as the Vietnam Veteran representative on the Pennsylvania Veterans Commission. He was reappointed by several Governors to continue serving until 2010. In 1991, he was elected Chairman of the PA Veteran's Commission and his peers re-elected him annually for the next 19 years. He was also appointed to serve on the PA Veterans Memorial Commission and the Vietnam Veterans Herbicide Commission. Hastings was awarded two Pennsylvania Meritorious Service Medals and the Commendation Medal by the PA National Guard. Paul was one of the initial six veterans to be inducted into the Pennsylvania Veteran's "Hall of Fame". Paul also served as Executive Director of the U. S. Marines Youth Foundation.

Upon his retirement from the Marine Corps he became an independent businessman starting P. Hastings Corporation in New Cumberland until he retired. Hastings remarried Carol after the loss of his first wife, Joan. Joan and Paul were married for 60 years and were the proud parents of Gary, Dona and Jodi. He and Carol reside in Michigan enjoying their retirement years by the lake. Paul and Carol enjoy spending time with family to include, his three children and their spouses, eleven grand-children and twenty great-grandchildren in Pennsylvania as well as Carol's family in Michigan.

Jon had a big heart of compassion for others. Jonathan's helicopter came down on the evening of March 29 2011, during training maneuvers in Kaneohe Bay Hawaii.

A 2004 graduate of the United States Military Academy, West Point, Rob was Airborne and Air Assault qualified. After graduating from Ranger School, he reported to his assignment as an Infantry Platoon Leader with the 2 nd Battalion, 22 nd Infantry, 1 st Brigade Combat Team, 10 th Mountain Division, Ft. Drum NY. Rob died May 18, 2006, when his Humvee hit an IED during combat operations in the Abu Ghraib sector of Iraq. Rob had plans to put in for Special Forces on his return from Iraq.

Marine Capt. Bryan Willard

Douglas Willard graduated from Bryan Pennsboro High School, Enola, Penna, in June 1990. He attended Lock Haven University where he specialized in sports medicine. After graduating from Lock Haven, he furthered his education by securing accreditation in Mortuary Science and served his apprenticeship at Jesse H. Geigle Funeral Home, Harrisburg Penna. Bryan was attending a military exhibition on City Island, Harrisburg, when he was so impressed, at the age of 27, he decided he wanted to be a member of the Marine Corps, and serve his Country; his only request was that he wanted to fly. Captain Willard was assigned to Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 464, Marine Air Group 29, 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing II, Marine Expeditionary Force, New River, N.C. His flight training took him to the Naval Aviation Training Center near Pensacola, Florida. During his last leave period in the U.S., Bryan volunteered to fly reconnaissance missions to rescue residents of New Orleans in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina. He was recognized for his bravery and service in a Time Magazine article in 2005. A decorated Marine helicopter pilot, Captain Willard, at the age of 33 years, died Friday, 17 February 2006, during an anti-terrorist training mission in the Godoria Range area when the CH-53 helicopter crashed in Northern Djibouti on the Horn of Africa, near the Sea of Aden. Bryan is buried in Arlington Cemetery, Section 60.






